Swimming - Held and Escobedo Contesting World Championships

The FINA World Swimming Championships in Abu Dhabi began on Thursday, December 16th and will run until Tuesday, December 21st. On the first day of competition, Ryan Held and his US teammates secured the bronze medal in the 4x100m freestyle relay, with a finishing time of 3:05.42. The Russian Swimming Federation (RSF) won the event in 3:03.45 with Italy second in 3:03.61. **Held** will also be contesting the 50m freestyle, the 100m freestyle and other relays for Team USA. **Emily Escobedo** will race the 100m and 200m breaststroke.
