# Wrestling - Two Make the Team

NYAC wrestlers Adeline Gray (76kg) and Sarah Hildebrandt (50kg) secured places on the US Olympic team for Tokyo by claiming victories in the US Trials held in Fort Worth, TX last weekend. Two more NYAC wrestlers, Jesse Porter (77kg, Greco-Roman) and Adam Coon (130kg, Greco-Roman) were also victorious, but must qualify their weight classes before booking their tickets. #### Judo

The NYAC judo program is among the best in the world, having been integral to the careers of the legendary Jimmy Pedro, Jason Morris, Travis Stevens, Ronda Rousey and Kayla Harrison, among others. As the Tokyo Games draw near, the Club's judokas are intent on emulating their predecessors. Here's what's coming up. On April 17th, Katelyn Jarrell (52kg) contests the Pan Am Open in Guadalajara, Mexico. On April 24th-25th, Jack Yonezuka (-66kg) and Nick Yonezuka (-81kg) compete in the Pan Am Open in Punta Cana, Domincan Republic. On May 5th-7th, the Grand Slam in Kazan, Russia will have the following on the roster: Angelica Delgado (-52kg), Katelyn Jarrell (-52kg), Alisha Galles (-63kg), Adonis Diaz (-60kg), Jacob More (-60kg), Alex Turner (-73kg), Colton Brown (-90kg), Nake Keeve (-100kg). All eyes are on the Games; official selections will be made in June.

# Rowing - Trials in NJ

The second stage of the US Olympic rowing trials take place from April 12th-16th in West Windsor, NJ. NYAC Olympians Meghan O'Leary and Ellen Tomek compete in the women's double. That boat is already qualified for Tokyo, so whoever wins will be named to the Tokyo Olympic team. O'Leary and Tomek are among the favorites, along with a talented crew from Boston. Michael DiSanto contests the men's pair and Connor Corwen competes in the men's quad; but, the pair and the quad still



have to go to Lucerne to race in the final Olympic qualification regatta (May 15th-17th) where the top two places in each event get team spots. DiSanto and his partner are the only entry in the Trials, so it looks good for them. Corwen's quad is an underdog, but anything is possible. Full entries for the Trials and previews are here.

#### 125 Years Ago This Week

On April 6th, 1896, the inaugural Modern Olympic Games opened in Athens, Greece. Approximately 245 athletes represented 14 nations in 43 events. No women took part. The NYAC's

Thomas Burke won the 100m and the 400m. Among other events contested were one-handed



weightlifting and a 100m freestyle for members of the Greek navy. Baron Pierre de Coubertin, the founding father of the modern Games, originally intended them to take place in 1900 in his home city of Paris; but, Greek enthusiasm for the concept was such that Athens - abetted by a donation of one million drachma from businessman Georgios Averoff - received the nod, igniting the flame of a global phenomenon.
