



Musnicki, Fleming, Davis and McCoy Inducted into NYAC Hall of Fame

Wednesday, June 22nd; NYAC City House - At a gala celebration at the New York Athletic Club on Wednesday evening, four NYAC athletes received the highest honor that the Club can bestow upon its members - induction into the NYAC Hall of Fame. In more customary times, this event is held every two years. Having been disrupted by the pandemic, however, this was the first induction ceremony since 2019, making it all the more celebratory. Receiving this singular honor were athletes from the sport of wrestling - **Kristie Davis** (née Marano) and **Kerry McCoy** - rowing - **Meghan Musnicki** - and track and field - **Tom Fleming** (posthumously), represented at the banquet by his daughter Margot. Davis and McCoy are legendary in the world of wrestling. In the course of her career, Davis garnered nine US titles and nine world championships medals, two of which were gold (2000, 2003). McCoy was just as dominant, with a world championships silver (2003), a Pan Am Games gold (2003), five consecutive US titles, two Olympic Games and an 88 bout collegiate winning streak. In rowing, Musnicki is among the most successful competitors of all time with three Olympic appearances and two gold medals, plus six world championship medals (five gold and one bronze) and 11 World Cup medals. In the world of track and field, Tom Fleming was renowned one of the most feared competitors on the road racing circuit, winning the celebrated New York City Marathon twice (1973, 1975) and placing second in Boston twice (1973, 1974). Among the athletic stars attending the NYAC event were rowers Olivia Coffey, Kristine O'Brien and Katelin Gueregian, and track and field legends Craig Virgin and Bill Rodgers. Swimming - World Championships Gold for Held



Saturday, June 18th; Budapest, Hungary - Team USA, with the NYAC's **Ryan Held** and teammates Caeleb Dressel, Justin Ressa and Brooks Curry, secured a gold medal in the 4x100m freestyle relay at the FINA long course World Championships, recording a time of 3:09.34. Held swam the second leg in 46.99 seconds, the fastest 100m split of the US squad. Australia finished second (3:10.80) and Italy third (3:10.95). Track and Field - Price and Mattis Make World Championships Team

Friday, June 24th; Eugene, OR - On the first morning of the US national track and field championships, the NYAC's defending world hammer throw champion, **DeAnna Price**, and discus thrower **Sam Mattis** secured their places on the US team for next month's world championships, also being held in Eugene, OR. Price, who has struggled with injury over the past year, placed fourth in her event (73.07m/239-8), but receives a bye to the world championships as defending champion. Mattis called his throws "ugly," but his third place (62.25m/204-2) and qualifying standard secured his team place, nonetheless.

- Friday, June 17th; Miramar, FL** - 2016 Rio Paralympic 1500m champion and Long-Island native **Mikey Brannigan** won the T20 1500m at the 2022 US Paralympic Track and Field Championships with a mark of 3:57.12. [Click here](#) for full results.
- Saturday, June 18th; Paris, France** - Olympic discus champion **Valarie Allman** won the Diamond League Paris Meeting with a meet record of 68.68m/225'4", defeating Sandra Perkovic of Croatia who took second with a season best of 68.19m/223-8. [Click here](#) for results.
- Friday, June 17th - Sunday, June 19th; Olympic Valley, CA** - The NYAC's **David Kilgore** (track and field) and **Eli Hemming** (triathlon) had fine finishes at the Broken Arrow Skyrace, a three-day, multi-race trail running affair set in the mountains of Olympic Valley. On Friday, Hemming finished second in the "Vertical K," a 6.9K/4.25-mile race with a vertical gain of 954m/3135 feet, equivalent to running up the Empire State Building twice in a row, plus 227 feet. Hemming completed the race in 42:36. Cameron Smith of Crested Butte won in 42:25. On Saturday, Hemming raced the 26K, which had a 1533m/5030-foot vertical gain and loss, placing second in 1:51:00; Andy Wacker of Boulder won in 1:50:11. Kilgore finished second overall in the "Triple Crown," consisting of the "Vertical K", the 26K and a 52K on Sunday. Before turning pro, Kilgore ran cross country and track for the University of Colorado and the University of Florida; Hemming ran cross country and track for the Metropolitan State University of Denver. Rowing - World Cup Silver for Wanamaker

Thursday, June 16th-Monday, June 19th; Poznan, Poland - **Maddie Wanamaker** placed second in the pair and **Charlotte Buck** and **Kelsey Reelick** finished fourth in the four at the World Rowing Cup II in Poznan, Poland. In the pair, Wanamaker, a 2017 University of Wisconsin graduate and Tokyo 2020 Olympian, and teammate Claire Collins secured their silver with a time of 7:18.82, just over two seconds behind the Netherlands' winning 7:16.61. Ireland was third in 7:26.16. In the four, Buck, Reelick and teammates Kristina Wagner and Jessica Thoennes finished in a time of 6:44.71, installing them in fourth place. Australia took the win in 6:39.72. The World Cup II is part of the selection procedure for the 2022 World Rowing Championships, which will take place in Racice, Czech Republic from September 18th to 25th. Water Polo - World Champs Under Way

Saturday, June 18th-Sunday, July 3rd; Budapest, Hungary - As of today, June 24th, the US women stand at the top of Group B at the World Water Polo Championships, having defeated South Africa 24-2, the Netherlands 11-7 and Argentina 23-3. With such a dominant record, the US enters the round of 16 as a powerful favorite to take an unprecedented fourth consecutive world title. The US women's squad features the NYAC's **Ashleigh Johnson**, **Maddie Musselman**, **Rachel Fattal**, **Maggie Steffens**, **Stephania Haralabidis**, **Kaleigh Gilchrist**, **Jordan Raney** and **Amanda Longan**. The US men are seeking their first ever world championships medals. As of Friday morning, they were placed third in Group D after a 13-17 loss to Serbia and a 17-4 victory over Kazakhstan. They face Australia tomorrow. The men's squad features the NYAC's **Alex Bowen**, **Matt Farmer**, **Max Irving** and **Ben Stevenson**. The US competition schedule is as follows: **Women:** Round of 16 (6/26), quarter-finals (6/28), semi-finals (6/30), final (7/2); **Men:** Australia (6/25), Round of 16 (6/27), quarter-finals (6/29), semi-finals (7/1), finals (7/3).
