# JUDO: YONEZUKA TAKES SILVER AT WORLD JUNIORS



Wednesday, October 4th - Saturday, October 7th; Odivelas, Portugal – On Thursday, October 5th, the NYAC's Jack Yonezuka claimed the -73kg silver medal at the 2023 Junior Judo World Championships, making him the first US man in history to secure a Junior World silver medal. After receiving a bye in the first round of competition, Yonezuka defeated Brazil's Vinicius Ardina in the second round and Tajikistan's Muhiddin Asadulloev in the third round. On the quarterfinal, Nicole Jomantas of USA Judo wrote, "[Yonezuka] threw Mouhammad Gazaloev (BEL) for ippon early in the second minute. Yonezuka drew 2022 Cadet World Champion Keito Kihara (JPN) in the semifinals just a day after Japan swept the lightweight gold medals in both the men's and women's events. Yonezuka scored first, throwing Kihara for a waza-ari in the second minute, but was caught by Kihara for a waza-ari in the third minute to tie the score. At the end of regulation, each athlete had a waza-ari and a penalty. Just 14 seconds into Golden Score (sudden death overtime), both athletes were given a stalling penalty putting the pressure on. Less than a minute later, Yonezuka seized an opportunity and threw Kihara for another waza-ari. The win put Yonezuka into the finals for the first time for a U.S. athlete at Junior Worlds since Kayla Harrison (Middletown, Ohio) won gold in 2008 and silver in 2009. In the finals, Yonezuka and 2022 European Junior Champion Vusal Galandarzade (AZE) battled for four minute without a score. In the

first exchange of overtime, however, Galandarzade threw
Yonezuka for ippon (instant win) to claim gold. The silver
medal finish makes Yonezuka one of just five U.S. athletes
ever to advance to the Junior World finals and the only man."

## Track and Field: McFadden Claims Bronze in Chicago

Sunday, October 8th; Chicago, Illinois – The NYAC's Tatyana McFadden, 20-time Paralympic medalist and 24-time World Major Marathon champion, secured the women's wheelchair bronze medal at the 2023 Chicago Marathon with a finish of 1:41:17. Switzerland's Catherine Debrunner won in 1:38:44, and fellow American Susannah Scaroni took second with 1:38:46. On the race, World Para Athletics wrote, "The women's wheelchair competition was a battle from start to finish between USA's Susannah Scaroni (USA) and Switzerland's world record holder Catherine Debrunner. The two traded the lead throughout the race with Debrunner taking over for the last time in the final mile. After the turn onto Columbus Drive, Debrunner was able to pull slightly ahead, winning in a new course record of 1:38:44, two seconds ahead of Scaroni. "It was an amazing race," said Debrunner, who was competing in the United States for the first time. "I had a really great race together with Susannah Scaroni. She attacked really hard at the last hill, but I could fight and I made it. I am really proud of both of us." Nine-time Chicago champion Tatyana McFadden, who previously held the course



record, finished third in 1:41:17. The women's race saw 19 competitors from six countries on the streets of Chicago." Click here for full results and here for competition footage from Chicago.
